Engineer I-II-III-IV Public Works

The Department The overall mission of **Public Works** is to plan, design, construct, operate and maintain the County infrastructure, which includes public roads, transportation systems, bridges, water, wastewater, channel maintenance and solid waste disposal systems of the County, in order to best serve the interests of the people. These systems are maintained to protect the health and welfare of the public and the County's financial investments. Public Works also provides vehicle support for the County, including procurement support, heavy and light vehicle maintenance and repair, and daily rental services.

The Position While the Engineers I, II, and III classes are unlicensed, and the Engineer IV is licensed, all levels perform professional field and office engineering work in the planning, engineering and management of capital public works projects. Engineers provide specialized technical expertise within their respective Public Works division by performing advanced field and office engineering work in connection with the design, construction and management of major public works projects. Generally, Engineers I and II perform technical work to support engineering efforts under close oversight; an Engineer III may serve as a team lead and/or resident engineer for given projects, with minimal oversight; and an Engineer IV provides full project management and technical expertise to leadership to assist in the coordination, development and delivery of capital project plans, programs and projects.

Engineers for Public Works interpret and apply local ordinances, improvement standards and policies during development and delivery of capital projects and preparation of engineering studies. Depending on the level, duties may also include preparing and reviewing construction plans; reviewing subdivision maps and plans; inspecting or initiating inspection of projects during construction and upon completion determining conformance with standards and specifications.

At all levels, engineers may plan, assign, train, supervise and evaluate the work of assigned staff, and resolve personnel and staffing matters.

<u>Career Advancement Opportunities</u> As experience, education and/or certification are gained, employees may be eligible to promote through the Engineer series. In addition to promotional opportunities, San Joaquin County offers an educational reimbursement program to help eligible employees with costs of tuition when they continue their education or return to school.

Bridge Engineering: An amazing team responsible for inspection and maintenance of more than 260 bridges -- the 3rd largest collection of bridges of any County in California. The Division is responsible for delivering the award-winning Bollea Road Bridge Emergency Repairs, recognized by the California Transportation Foundation.

Design Engineering: Our talented Design Engineering group is responsible for a \$15 million annual roadway safety, maintenance and rehabilitation program. Its projects include the Acampo Drainage Innovation Project, which provides flooding relief to thousands of residents.

Field Engineering: At the forefront of surveying innovation with drones and robotic surveying equipment, Field Engineering administers and inspects subdivision improvements and capital improvement projects, such as the award-winning Lower Sacramento Road Improvements. The division also collaborates with utility companies to resolve right-of-way conflicts.

Flood Management/Water Resources: This Division plays a vital role in protecting the County's prized asset: The San Joaquin Delta. Other initiatives include regionally significant projects to explore groundwater recharge and underground surface water storage.

Solid Waste: This group manages four solid waste facilities including the largest permitted sanitary landfill in California, which houses a landfill gas-to-energy plant that provides electricity to East Bay

customers. Future projects include additional landfill gas collection systems and a possible solar energy generation plant.

Transportation Engineering: Responsible for the design and analysis of the County's 1,672 miles of roadway, this Division has received several awards for its innovative implementation of a temporary roundabout at a regionally significant intersection. The team is an active participant in emerging technologies, such as autonomous vehicles and intelligent transportation systems.
