The role works in close partnership with the Director and County leadership to help guide direction, policy, governance, and the effective allocation of technology resources.

Technology is a critical enabler of County services, and this position plays an important role in aligning technology solutions with business needs, improving service delivery, and strengthening public trust through reliable, secure, and forward-looking systems. The ideal candidate brings strong leadership and management capabilities, along with demonstrated experience operating in complex, large-scale environments. This includes the ability to lead teams, influence across departments, and navigate the unique demands of government technology and infrastructure. Demonstrated, progressive leadership experience in information technology is required, including experience at a senior management or executive level. Candidates should have a proven track record of leading large-scale, complex technology environments, delivering strategic initiatives, and aligning technology with organizational goals. Experience in areas such as enterprise systems, infrastructure, cybersecurity, and technology governance is highly desirable. DESIRABLE QUALIFICATIONS

A highly qualified candidate will possess a combination of the following desirable qualifications. All interested candidates are encouraged to apply.

Experience: Progressive leadership experience in information technology, including experience at a senior management or executive level, is strongly preferred. Candidates should demonstrate a track record of leading large-scale, complex technology environments, driving strategic initiatives, and aligning technology with organizational outcomes.

Education: A bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university is desirable; however, an equivalent combination of education, professional experience, and demonstrated leadership in information technology may be considered.

Certifications: Possession of relevant industry-recognized certifications may be considered as part of a candidate's overall qualifications, particularly where they demonstrate expertise in areas such as technology leadership, cybersecurity, enterprise architecture, or service management.

APPLICATION AND SELECTION PROCESS

To apply, submit a completed application and supplemental questionnaire on or before the final filing date. Resumes will not be accepted in lieu of completed application package. If warranted, by the number of applicants, applications may be reviewed by a screening panel. If utilized, the screening panel will select those most qualified to be considered for participation in the selection process. Final candidates will be interviewed by a designated panel and confirmation appointment will be made by the Information Systems Director.

A background investigation will be required for all final candidates. Final appointment will be conditional upon passing a drug screening test, background investigation, as well as DOJ Live Scan fingerprinting.

- Evaluates new developments in the IT industry and communicates to customer departments potential benefits which may be realized.
- Implements and encourages the strategic direction for Information Technology including consultative services on a countywide basis to improve operational effectiveness of information technology.
- Initiates projects to review, evaluate, recommend and implement approved changes in technology or service practices to improve the efficiency of the division.
- Develops training plans and programs to promote the development of staff for the benefit of the County.

ARTS, CULTURE, AND RECREATION

The arts and culture provide a much-needed respite from everyday worries and the Haggin Museum, San Joaquin County Historical Museum, and Stockton Children's Museum are popular spots. The Stockton Symphony, San Joaquin County Ballet, and Stockton Civic Theater provide important experiences for children and adults. The multi-cultural community offers a diversity of views and opinions in its art and culture, providing a wealth of knowledge about past and present on canvas and stage.

Over 75 languages are spoken within the region and there is richness in the blending of cultures and ways that creates an air of celebration about individual customs, foods and cultures.

San Joaquin County government provides nine community parks for boating, camping, and picnicking, swimming and organized sports. Annual family events include the Asparagus Festival, attended by thousands of fun-seekers from the County and beyond.

Individual cities and communities provide a host of other opportunities, from Lodi Lake Park and Nature Area to the Woodbridge Ecological Reserve. The County-owned and operated Micke Grove Park offers a zoo, rides and a historical museum to delight both children and adults. The San Joaquin Delta is one of the area's best kept secrets and offers some of the best boating in the state: more than 1,000 miles of waterways stretching from the Stockton Harbor to north of Sacramento and offering access to the San Francisco Bay.

HOUSING

Housing is plentiful in San Joaquin County and is affordable when compared to other nearby areas.

Housing ranges from new developments to historic homes found mostly in central Stockton and downtown Lodi. San Joaquin County is a place where families can grow, learn, and experience the nature and beauty of the California landscape while benefiting from the unique opportunities - cultural, recreational, and educational - that the area provides.

EDUCATION

From preschool to higher education, the County has it covered with an abundant array of public or private opportunities to learn and grow. The University of the Pacific, California State University, Stanislaus-Stockton Center, Humphreys College and Law School, National University, and the San Joaquin Delta Community College offer a wide variety of choices for educational opportunities. The County's 17 school districts provide families with a wide choice for children's educational development.

AGRICULTURE

The county is one of the most agriculturally rich regions in California. Milk is the leading commodity in the area. Grapes, almonds, cherries, and walnuts round out the top crops, with an abundance of other produce. Grapes make up 81,600 bearing acres, much of which are wine grapes. There are over 85 wineries with over 125 different varieties represented within the Lodi Appellation offering opportunities for tasting and special events.

Weekly farmers markets throughout the county offer a cornucopia of fresh fruit and vegetables. Fruit stands and pick-your-own produce farms dot the countryside.
